DECEMBER 13: St. Lucy, Virgin and Martyr

St. Lucy, also called **Saint Lucia** (*Latin: Sancta Lucia*) or **Saint Lucy**, is said to have been martyred in Syracuse, Sicily, about 304, during the persecution under Diocletian (emperor 284–305). Devotion to her in Sicily was popular by the fifth century, and from there, during the following centuries, it spread to Rome and northern Italy. Her name is found in the Roman Canon, one of eight women included in this prayer. Whatever else is said about St. Lucy's martyrdom is derived from an account of her death written about two centuries later and is hence of questionable reliability. The name Lucy means "light," and this is most



probably why she had been invoked, especially during the Middle Ages, against blindness and in cases of eye disease. She is often portrayed with two eyes on a dish. St. Lucy is the patron saint of the city of Syracuse in Sicily. On her feast day a silver statue of St. Lucy containing her relics is paraded through the streets before returning to the Cathedral of Syracuse.

With Lucy's feast day being on 13 December, it once coincided with the Winter Solstice, the shortest day of the year, (this was before calendar reforms), so her feast day has become a festival of light this is particularly seen in Scandinavian countries, with their long dark winters. There, a young girl dressed in a white dress and a red sash (as the symbol of martyrdom) carries palms and wears a crown or wreath of candles on her head. In Denmark, Norway, Sweden, and parts of Finland, girls dressed as Lucy carry **St. Lucia buns** in procession as songs are sung. It is said that to vividly celebrate St. Lucy's Day will help one live the long winter days with enough light.

The Caribbean island of Saint Lucia, one of the Windward Islands in the Lesser Antilles, is named after her.

O-Antiphons (also known as the Greater Antiphons). 17-23 December

The antiphons sung before and after Magnificat at Vespers, according to Roman use, on the seven days preceding Christmas Eve, i.e. from 17th to 23rd December.

The name is derived from their initial 'O'—'O Sapientia', 'O Adonai', 'O Radix Jesse', 'O Clavis David', 'O Oriens', 'O Rex gentium', and 'O Emmanuel'. The Sarum Use (Salisbury Rite) began the Antiphons on 16th Dec., and provided an additional 'O' for 23rd Dec. ('O Virgo virginum'), and this arrangement is reflected by the insertion of 'O Sapientia' for 16 Dec. in the calendar of the BCP. Now changed to 17th December in the modern Calendar. The authorship and date of composition of the Antiphons are alike unknown; but they were already in use by the 8th cent.

Antiphon (Greek, originally. 'something sung alternately by two choirs'). In the Western Church, these are sentences, usually from Scripture, recited before and after the Psalms and Canticles in the Divine Office. They vary with the season or feast, and are often intended to indicate the spirit in which the (invariable) Psalms and Canticles are sung.
