Anzac Day: what does it mean for Christian people?

Anzac Day commemorates the landing of Australian and New Zealand troops at Gallipoli, Turkey (then part of the Ottoman Empire) on 25 April 1915. After enduring a determined enemy, difficult living conditions and significant losses, ANZAC forces made a successful withdrawal in December, planned by their leaders. The campaign was a failure, but their military reputation was enhanced, marked by bravery under fire, acceptance of danger, a spirit of 'make-do' and independence, and deep camaraderie. That Anzac Day marks a noble defeat is important for Australian identity, evoking the pioneer tradition of persevering through adversity.

Anzac commemorations began the following year, and have continued since. Two Anglican clergymen shaped its early character. The Rev'd Albert White initiated a dawn service in Albany, WA, the point of departure for most Australian troops. After the refrain "As the sun rises and goeth down, we will remember them", he led those present in prayer, and 'Last Post' and 'Reveille' were played. In Queensland, Canon David Garland promoted the day as "Australia's All Souls' Day"; he placed Binyon's 'Od e to the Fallen' on the cover of a 1921 service booklet. But the Great War had brought a deep sense of mourning which transcended Australian class and sectarian divisions. Both men were thus conscious that the day held a wide significance, and sought to develop rituals in which those of any faith or none could participate. Thus, in the face of diverse understandings of 'prayer for the dead', the (originally two) minute silence was introduced to allow each person present to pray, or not pray, in accordance with his or her individual beliefs.

Anzac Day services have been sponsored by bodies such as the RSL since 1929, when the day was first observed nationally, and the participation of Christian clergy is generally welcomed. There are dangers involved, not so much of glorifying war, as of confusing ideas about 'sacrifice', notably overly close parallels between the atoning death of Christ and the tragic death of military forces. Soldiers do not go to war looking to die, to 'sacrifice themselves', but rather look to return home safely. Yet the willingness to face danger, becoming disabled or even dying is profoundly praiseworthy.

The ambiguous character of the day remains important, including the linking of the serious services of the morning with the games of the afternoon. Christian churches can make a significant contribution by continuing to point to solidarity in the face of defeat as shaping our national character, rather than the triumphal celebration of our achievements.

St. Mark, Evangelist (in Australia—April 26th)

St. Mark is the author of the second Gospel and was a member of the first Christian community in Jerusalem. His mother, Mary, owned the house where the Jerusalem Christians met for prayer and where Peter stayed after he had been miraculously liberated from prison (Acts 12:12–17). Mark accompanied Paul and Barnabas on their first missionary journey (Acts 12:25) to Antioch (today's Antakya, Turkey). He was likewise with Paul in Rome (Col. 4:10; Phlm. 24) and was associated with Peter in that same city (1 Pt. 5:13). It was most probably in Rome that Mark wrote his Gospel sometime after Peter's death (about 64) and before the year 70, basing it on Peter's preaching. Tradition has it that Mark subsequently went to Alexandria, where he was bishop and where he was martyred toward the end of the first century. His relics were taken (828)—supposedly to keep them from being profaned by unbelievers—by two Venetian merchants to Venice. His feast has been celebrated on April 25 from earliest times.
