THE MINISTRY OF THE WORD

A reading from the Book Genesis [15.1–12, 17–18

The word of the LORD came to Abram in a vision, 'Do not be afraid, Abram, I am your shield; your reward shall be very great.' But Abram said, 'O Lord GOD, what will you give me, for I continue childless, and the heir of my house is Eliezer of Damascus?' And Abram said, 'You have given me no offspring, and so a slave born in my house is to be my heir.'

But the word of the LORD came to him, 'This man shall not be your heir; no one but your very own issue shall be your heir.' He brought him outside and said, 'Look towards heaven and count the stars, if you are able to count them.' Then he said to him, 'So shall your descendants be.' And he believed the LORD; and the LORD reckoned it to him as righteousness.

Then he said to him, 'I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans, to give you this land to possess.' But he said, 'O Lord GOD, how am I to know that I shall possess it?' He said to him, 'Bring me a heifer three years old, a female goat three years old, a ram three years old, a turtle-dove, and a young pigeon.' ¹⁷ When the sun had gone down and it was dark, a smoking fire-pot and a flaming torch passed between these pieces. On that day the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying, 'To your descendants I give this land, from the river of Egypt to the great river, the river Euphrates.'.

He will transform the body of our humiliation that it may be conformed to the body of his glory, by the power that also enables him to make all things subject to himself. Therefore, my brothers and sisters, whom I love and long for, my joy and crown, stand firm in the Lord in this way, my beloved.

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The Second Sunday of Lent

Genesis 15:1–12, 17–18. Philippians 3:17–4:1. Luke 13:31–end.

The question raised by Philippians 3:17 is: how on earth can the Philippian church, Gentile Christians mostly, 'join in imitating' Paul? The chapter so far describes how Paul came to regard his orthodox Jewish background as 'rubbish', and gave it up to gain Christ. What has that to do with them?

Today's epistle urges the Philippians to adopt the same attitude to their own privileges as Paul did to his. They belonged to a Roman colony; and, though Paul could make creative use of his Roman citizenship, his gospel cut across the grain of orthodox Roman belief and practice. Fifty years earlier, the Mediterranean world hailed Augustus as 'saviour' and 'lord'. He had, after all, brought peace (of a sort) to the known world, and ruled unchallenged over an unprecedentedly large empire. Roman citizens, wherever they were, cherished both their status and their security. If enemies threatened, their saviour-lord would come from the mother city to rescue them. By Paul's day, Caesar was openly worshipped, at least in the Eastern Mediterranean.

Verses 20–21 must be read against that background. For the Christian there is only one Saviour and Lord, only one mother city, only one hope. The Philippians must be ready to abandon the imitation in order to embrace the reality. The conclusion of the argument at 4:1 (congratulations to the lectionary for getting it right), encourages them to find their identity and security in this 'Lord' and in nobody else.

They are, in consequence, to engage in the same holy boldness with which Jesus, at one remove, confronted Herod. Herod may only have been a tinpot little monarch compared with Caesar, but his sly threats were real enough. Jesus had sovereign confidence in God's overarching plan: when he declares it impossible for a prophet to die outside Jerusalem, he is not making a statement about history so much as asserting that his own prophetic vocation, which his divine commissioner would safeguard, would be accomplished there and there only. He would be enthroned, however paradoxically, in Jerusalem, and Herod would be shown up as the impostor. The way of the cross, trodden by Jesus and commended by Paul, undercuts the claims of the rulers of this world.

It thereby also fulfils the ancient promise to Abram. At the start of Genesis 15, Abram doesn't even have an heir; by the end, he has been promised both an innumerable family and a substantial territory. The former will gain the latter through the hard road of slavery and rescue, the Old Testament's way of the cross (vv. 13–16). And, as Paul encourages the Philippians to lift their eyes to the heavenly Jerusalem, so God tells Abram to look to the starry heavens to see the wide extent of his promise. No good keeping one's eyes on the present rulers of Egypt or Canaan, of Galilee or Rome; God's kingdom will come on earth as in heaven, and it will come by the way of the cross.
